### IRA and 403(b) NEWS

#### Time for a retirement account check-in

A new school year is a good time to review your retirement account. Visit *your*MONEY online or call us at 1-800-279-4030 for assistance.

- Increase your 403(b) contributions by completing a new Salary Reduction Agreement.
- **Review and update your beneficiaries.** Beneficiaries named on your retirement account typically supersede your will.
- Update your address, review your portfolio, and rebalance your investment allocation.

#### Important deadlines for your accounts

**Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) requests:** If you receive your required minimum distribution in December and would like to submit QCDs to offset it, your QCD forms must be received in good order by November 14.



Conversion, transfer, exchange, or rollover requests and outgoing funds forms: Any request received in good order (including TPA approval) by December 1 will be forwarded to the payer company by year-end.



Withdrawal requests: Any withdrawal request received in good order (including TPA approval) by December 8 will be processed this year. If you want your distribution processed in the year 2026, do not send it in until after January 2, 2026. View the Special Tax Notice Regarding 403(b) Distributions at weabenefits.com/retirementforms.

We will continue to process all member requests received after the deadlines for current year processing to the best of our ability.

**Postdated checks:** We are unable to accept IRA contribution checks written and received this tax year (2025) for next tax year (2026). Postdated checks will be returned.

#### **Guaranteed Stable Investment**

The 2026 Guaranteed Stable Investment credited rate of return\* in the 403(b) and IRA programs will be announced in mid-December. More information on the fund can be found at weabenefits.com/empower.

Thinking of retiring soon? In the excitement of making plans for your retirement, it can be easy to focus on the upcoming day itself. However, you have some work to do before that day comes. The time leading up to retirement is critical for setting yourself up for fiscal success.

While nearly half of Americans (45%) say they feel financially prepared for retirement, 78% express concern about inflation affecting their retirement savings. Doing some prep work in the months before you retire can help you be better prepared financially for your post-career future.

Consider these 10 money moves to make as you get ready for retirement, and know you have a partner in Member Benefits to help you with questions and information you may need along the way.

### 1 Pad your emergency account

Having a solid emergency account in retirement is essential. For example, when you're no longer working, you could incur significant costs for one or more major health issues, home repairs, or car damage. Having funds to help you cover any large, unforeseen expenses can help you avoid using up your retirement assets or piling up credit card debt in retirement.

Having an easily accessible emergency fund is just as important as saving in a 403(b) or IRA, so do the best you can to shore up your savings before you retire. In general, it is recommended to have 12 to 24 months of living expenses saved for emergencies. Consider using a high-yield or money market account for higher interest rates and accessibility.

### Consider catch-up contributions

Want to accelerate your retirement savings amount, compensate for lost time, leverage tax benefits, and/or get closer to your retirement goals?

If you're 50 or over, you can contribute an extra \$7,500 to your 403(b) plan. In addition, in 2025, the SECURE 2.0 Act added an age 60-63 super catch-up limit in the 403(b), which allows certain employees to increase their total elective contributions up to \$11,250 (if allowed in your plan). The standard contribution limit resumes the year you turn 64.

In your IRA, you can add an extra \$1,000 if you're 50 or over.

Remember, saving in a 403(b) or IRA has tax advantages. A traditional account is one where contributions may be tax deductible now but you pay tax on withdrawals. A Roth account is one in which you pay taxes now but qualified distributions later are tax free.<sup>2</sup> You'll want to plan for the types of accounts and amount of savings in each that fit your goals and needs in retirement best. Member Benefits' financial advisors can help you with that.

### 3 Use your district benefits

While you're still working and have health care coverage, get in your doctor's appointments, minor surgeries, or other medical procedures. Use your Flexible Spending Account (FSA) or Health Savings Account (HSA) money if you have it.

It may make sense to schedule appointments before the end of the year. If your health insurance plan is tied to the calendar year and you are close to meeting your deductible and out-of-pocket maximum, your insurance may cover the cost of

most or all of your qualified health care expenses. Check your health care plan rules.

Contact your district office or human services department to clarify any post-employment benefits you might be qualified for, such as contributions to pay employee stipends or retiree benefits. These nonelective contributions may be made to the employee's 403(b) account for up to five years following the year of retirement. As an added benefit, neither the employer nor employee are subject to FICA taxes.

Our plan administration team is happy to talk to you about the various benefits of post-employment contributions and/or assist you with enrollment to accommodate these contributions.

### Be strategic with your end date

Retiring usually affects your health care coverage as well as your retirement account balance—and more. Make sure you understand all of the ways you'll be affected once you sever employment from your district. Keep in mind that health insurance coverage may end on your last day of work, the end of your last month at work, or some other time.

### Check your credit reports

You know it's a good idea to check your credit reports regularly, but be sure to check them again before the end of the year prior to retiring. It can alert you to potential mistakes or fraud and help you feel more confident going into retirement.

Entering retirement with a good credit score is important. Even if you don't plan on making any major purchases in retirement, circumstances can change. For instance, you may need to buy a new car, and a good credit score may give you better loan rates. If you choose to rent, a credit check may be required before you can secure a lease. Or if your insurance uses a credit-based insurance score to help determine your policy rate, a decent credit score may save you on premiums.

### 6 Consolidate your accounts

Keeping track of all your retirement accounts can be challenging, especially if you have 403(b) accounts left behind from old school districts. When you have numerous accounts,

### **BUDGETARY CONSIDERATIONS IN RETIREMENT**

1. Know your Social Security and Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS). Your Social Security benefit will vary based on the age you choose to start collecting it and your work history. Once you begin, keep up on any changes to the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) or other governmental decisions that may affect your monthly payment. For an estimate of your future Social Security benefits, create a *my Social Security* account at ssa.gov/myaccount.

As a Wisconsin public school employee, you likely qualify for the WRS pension plan, and a number of decisions need to be made. Visit the Wisconsin Department of Employee Trust Funds (etf.wi.gov) for resources, tools, and information. 2. Plan for your Medicare premiums. Medicare costs and deductibles have been rising. Most people deduct Medicare Part B directly from their Social Security payments, which trims any COLA boosts you may plan for. Those who enroll in a Medicare Advantage or Part D plan will see widely varying costs per plan. Member Benefits offers a Medicare Supplement plan that helps pay some of the costs involved from gaps in Medicare coverage. Learn more at weabenefits.com/national/medicare-supplement-insurance.

3. Keep up on required minimum distributions (RMDs). People age 73 and older must make annual minimum withdrawals from traditional IRAs and workplace retirement plans. Your minimum distribution is a function of your account balance and your life expectancy. You can face significant penalties for not taking timely RMDs.







it's all too easy to overlook fees and fund performance.

Managing your investment accounts can become easier when you consolidate by:

- Streamlining your investment strategy, beneficiaries, and required minimum distributions.
- Reducing the need to manage extra usernames and passwords.
   (Use a password manager app and two-step verification when available to help secure your account.)
- Making estate planning easier, with fewer accounts for your heirs to manage and less risk of money being overlooked.

If you're interested in consolidating your accounts, stick with us. You can stay with Member Benefits in retirement and take advantage of investment guidance, access to financial advice, and strategies to help you plan your withdrawals in retirement through *your*INCOME PATH (see page 7). ### 7 Take a look at tax implications

Wondering whether you have to pay taxes in retirement? The short answer is yes. While you may no longer have payroll taxes, you will have to pay some taxes depending on your income level and other factors. This may include federal and state income taxes, sales tax, proper-

ty tax, net investment income tax (if over certain income thresholds), and tax on Social Security benefits.

You may want to speak with a tax advisor or financial advisor to help prepare yourself for these potential costs in retirement.

### Practice living on a retirement budget

Consider trying a three or six month dry run on your projected retirement budget. It can help you get a feel for what your spending might be like and time to make any adjustments.

### 9 Consider a gradual exit

If you're unsure about whether you're financially or emotionally ready for retirement, consider part-time work. There might be opportunities within your district to help you ease in to a phased retirement, or you may want to try something different. It could be a good opportunity to enrich yourself by learning new skills and meeting new people.

WEA Member Benefits follows industry best practices to protect the privacy and security of your retirement account(s).

- Your account requires multi-factor authentication (MFA) to log in. MFA means that when you sign into your account for the first time on a new device or app, you will need a second verification method to prove who you are (in addition to your username and password).
- Your account is automatically locked after three unsuccessful login attempts in a row.
- A newly opened yourMONEY **account** will be automatically locked if you haven't set up your login credentials and MFA after 60 days.
- We require callers to authenticate themselves prior to discussing retirement account information.

- ACH transactions need to complete a real-time account verification that confirms bank account legitimacy.
- IP addresses are limited to within North America, adding additional protection against breaches.

- Use text, email, or authenticator apps.

- Don't click suspicious links in emails or texts.
- Verify requests for personal or financial info.
- Remember, banks rarely ask for sensitive info by email.

On August 4, roughly 200 total supporters—golfers, funding partners, sponsors, district representatives, business partners, strategic partners, student art contest finalists and their families, Member Benefits board members and staff, and others—enjoyed beautiful weather at our third annual Swing for a Cause golf event fundraiser. In total, we raised about \$45,000 for WEA Member Benefits Foundation's school mental health funding initiative.

Prepare early for flood insurance



An article on flood insurance, now? It may seem like an odd time of year to be talking about floods and flood insurance coverage, but it's something you want to consider well ahead of time so you can update your coverage *before* it happens to you.

#### Flood insurance facts

- It doesn't take a major body of water or even a major storm to cause a flood. You can live miles away from water and still be a victim of flooding. In fact, nearly 20% of all flood insurance claims come from areas with moderate-to-low flood risk.
- While some types of water damage may be covered under your home policy, you need separate coverage for flooding.

- Water damage due to drain and sewer backup or sump pump overflow may be covered if you've added an endorsement to your policy.
- \*\*Water coming in through the foundation is considered flooding. Many people think of flooding as "surface" flooding, such as what occurs near rivers and lakes. But ground water coming in is flooding. This is the case with all home policies in the United States.

#### What is flood insurance?

Flood insurance is a separate policy issued from the government called the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). It provides a means for property owners to financially protect themselves. The NFIP has an arrangement with private insurance

Keep in mind that there is typically a 30-day waiting period from date of purchase before a new flood policy goes into effect.

companies to sell and service flood insurance policies.

The NFIP offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners—if their community participates in the NFIP. Participating communities agree to adopt and enforce ordinances that meet or exceed FEMA requirements to reduce the risk of flooding. You can find participating communities at floodsmart.gov.



### **Roth IRA** conversions

#### I'm considering a Roth conversion to an IRA. What do I need to know?

"Recently, we've had an uptick in guestions about Roth IRA conversions," says Anna Edelstein, Financial Planning Supervisor at Member Benefits. "When talking it through with members, we first outline some basic information."

#### Types of IRAs

- Traditional IRAs are funded with pre-tax dollars. You pay taxes on any distributions when you or your heirs withdraw money from the account.
- Roth IRAs are funded with after-tax dollars and can add flexibility to your income strategy since you've already paid taxes on that money.

#### Roth rules


To qualify for the tax-free and penalty-free withdrawal of earnings, Roth IRA distributions must meet a five-year holding requirement and occur after age 59½. Tax-free and penalty-free withdrawals can also be made under other circumstances, such as the owner's death. The original Roth IRA owner is not required to make minimum annual withdrawals.


#### **Roth considerations**

Owning a Roth IRA is not a one-size-fits-all. Many factors should be considered, including your tax situation, existing IRA balances, and longterm goals. In addition, you may need to consider:

- Individuals 63 years and older should be aware of the potential effect this has on Medicare premiums. Converting traditional to Roth funds requires account holders to report that money as income on their taxes. If you complete a Roth conversion and that raises your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) past a certain level, you could be increasing the premiums you pay for Medicare B and D, reducing the intended tax savings.
- New state and local tax (SALT) deduction rules may add wrinkles for higher earners. The new law raised the SALT deduction cap from \$10,000 to \$40,000 in 2025. However, once income exceeds \$500,000, the benefit starts to phase out. Because Roth conversions add taxable income in the year they're made, some households could see their eligibility for the larger SALT deduction reduced.

"Tax strategies often have overlapping effects, and one move may influence another," adds Anna. "Additionally, converting from a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA is a taxable event. It's important to speak with a tax advisor and a financial advisor to see if Roth conversions are a suitable option for you and your financial situation."
